A CAPITAL OF CULTURE IN A RURAL AREA - CONTRADICTION OR NECESSITY?

In the city, the ever-growing metropolitan area, many people want to live – art, culture, good infrastructure, jobs, visitor streams of all kinds, all of this is taken for granted there.

And what about life in the countryside? The rural region has become a fragile space, often neglected by politics, overestimated in its traditions, underestimated in its possibilities. Sure, when it is endowed with such beauty as here in the Salzkammergut, it attracts masses of visitors. But is that enough?

23 municipalities in this unique landscape dared to be a Capital of Culture region together and seized the opportunity to network, engage in close exchange to reflect on themselves and their own history through art, artistic interventions, and cultural inspirations, to allow a different view of themselves, to confront new thoughts, influences, experiences, and visions, to understand each other better and to position themselves more differentiated in the European context.

What was?

Potential spaces were opened, existing ones were evaluated for their necessity or validity, and some were reactivated; contemporaries from the region and internationally were connected and allowed. In joint thinking, accommodating each other, playing, and experimenting, it was about exploring future perspectives, giving youth their space, questioning traditions for clichés or truth. Pressing questions of our time are much more concretely located and measured in the rural area: the noticeable climate change, the lack of personnel, perspectives for coming generations, building culture, accessibility, and public mobility.

The rural area offered us the opportunity to trace the mistakes and wounds caused by the never-really-questioned belief in technological and economic progress and to develop strategies on how to shape our shared life on this planet better, more sensibly, and sustainably – because we only have this one world. And of course, it was also about questioning the region's most important source of income, tourism, weighing the advantages and disadvantages, and under the motto "Sharing Salzkammergut – The Art of Traveling," showing how the rural area can be made interesting through art all year round and become an extended living space.

What remains?

What the European Capital of Culture leaves behind in this region are numerous revitalized museums and previously vacant buildings that have been reanimated and repurposed into art spaces. Admittedly, there are no monumental new buildings, but that was not planned given the comparatively modest means available – and probably not what this region most urgently needed.

Much more important are the intellectual constructs that a year of inclusive cultural operations have fostered. The Capital of Culture year has primarily built bridges, opened doors, and through countless artist exchanges, brought visions, critical reflection, connections, and networks at international, national, and regional levels.

These are fundamental building blocks for a new self-understanding and self-confidence, strengthening the foundation for an open, permeable society that does not inherently perceive different ways of thinking as hostile and can develop greater resilience due to its increased diversity. The European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 was never intended as a one-off event, nor is it now a completed project. Rather, it wants and will be the starting point for creating a sustainable future for all.

It has provided numerous impulses for the urbanization of a rural region while simultaneously indicating how the downsides of urbanization can be avoided. It has shown that art can make the region attractive beyond purely

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touristic goals, create living spaces, and generate jobs and opportunities for action. And it has demonstrated that the rural area, with all its old and newly widespread knowledge, has the chance to prove that nature and humanity can find a new assertion and coexist wisely without one-sided exploitation.

It is up to the numerous initiatives and projects that continue beyond the year as the Capital of Culture to make these visions a reality and allow the region to grow into a model for all of Europe and possibly the world. A successor institution has been established.

What can art do?

The primary objective of this in many ways unique Capital of Culture was to promote creativity and artistic creation as a value-creating resource and to represent all areas of life in their indispensable interrelation. The fact that this took place in a rural region for the first time has more than ever created occasions to question the value and possibilities of art and culture. What can they achieve in the thinking and concrete actions of the people, for whom we had 2,800 project participants and artists from 73 countries (as of 19.11.2024) perform?

In the end, it is clear that art always stimulates, sometimes also excites, but it certainly does not do justice to reduce the resonance to the often-reported outrage over a single dance performance. This is not only contradicted by the final report of the independent EU audit commission, which the Deputy Chairman Bogdan Andrzej Zdrojewski of the Culture Committee in the EU Parliament recently confirmed: "I have experienced more than 20 Capitals of Culture. This one has a richer program than most others I have seen." "The Pole appealed to all 23 municipalities and their political leaders to continue the chosen path." (OÖN 31.10.2024). Around 600,000 visitors (as of 19.11.2024) and the many lively and appreciative discussions and feedback we have experienced speak a clear language.

Nevertheless, current election results and the globally observable developments in our societies can cast doubt on the society-building power of art. But resignation cannot be the answer.

Rather, it is precisely in the face of the impending loss of our most fundamental values that our task is to strengthen art and culture as perhaps the last remaining corrective. Art opens poetic thinking spaces, enables insight through sensory experience, it creates culture and cultivates us. It shows us the way to the intellectual free space that every society needs: because no one is like the other, but the other is just as important as oneself.

The conclusion after a year of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 can only be: Art is a shaping force, it is not a privilege for elites, not replaceable, and cannot be measured with money. Art is the essential substance that ensures our survival, an indispensable investment in the future, and an elemental necessity that we must hold on to, even if developments give rise to doubts.

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FACTS AND FIGURES

VISITORS

The European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 can report very pleasing visitor numbers as of November 19, 2024: around 600,000 (600,440).

200 projects were implemented by the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024, many of them in cooperation with partners and project sponsors. As of now, these projects have been visited by around 408,000 (407,934) people. The counting degree is 58%.

Additionally, about 100 associated projects were included in the official program and supported through promotional efforts. These projects recorded 192,506 visitors, with a current counting rate of approximately 27%.

39 projects were dedicated to art in public spaces (exhibitions, sculptures, interventions), which were perceived by passers-by, tourists, commuters, etc., but were not counted in terms of visitor statistics. This includes, for example, "Atemluft" by Xenia Hausner in Bad Ischl, the installation of the project "WOHLSTAND (Afterparty)" in Bad Aussee, or "Memories from the Future" by Eva Schlegel and 2MVD in Traunkirchen and Ebensee, etc.

2,800 project participants and artists from 73 countries (as of November 19, 2024) have made the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 an international event. The Capital of Culture itself has participated in six EU projects, four of which will continue beyond the year 2024.

A detailed quantitative report will be published in 2025. Since 2022, the Vienna University of Economics and Business (NPO Competence Center) has been conducting a social impact analysis (SROI), which extends beyond the title year. The final results of this analysis will be available at the end of 2025.

It should be noted that there are few large-capacity event venues in rural areas. For this reason, the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 uses extraordinary locations for performative events, such as the Salinenhalle in Ebensee with "BRUCKNERS SALZ" or the sports hall in Steinbach with "ALLES SCHON WEGKOMPONIERT", and also realizes many smaller events and exhibitions.

ECONOMY

"The fact that the interaction between the economy and culture can make a difference has been impressively demonstrated by the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024. Great opportunities presented themselves, and we seized them. In the tourism sector alone, 200 new jobs were created, even though employment was declining in comparable regions in Upper Austria. The regional economy used the stage of the Capital of Culture to present their export companies in the form of short videos worldwide through its foreign trade network with its 100 branches. The cultural events not only attracted international guests but were also used to forge new business contacts. The fact that the tourism school has recorded over 50% more enrollments than in previous years is largely due to the resounding success and contemporary approach of the "Wirtshauslabor" at Bad Ischl train station. Alone, 850 media reports about this project attest to the radiance of the title of a European Capital of Culture. With the project "SCALA Salzkammergut Craft Art Lab", an international artist-in-residence program could take place around the Hand.Werk.Haus Salzkammergut. Outstanding craftsmen and artists from other countries and continents met with regional businesses, artists, schools, and guests and engaged in an inspiring exchange. The project "Design.Handwerk.Technologie", an

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initiative of the University of Art and Design Linz with the Hand. Werk. Haus Salzkammergut and leading craft businesses, aims to further ignite the innovative spirit in the region. Even if the international spotlight fades now, we have gained many ideas and set initiatives to positively develop the region further. **Robert Oberfrank, District Office Manager, WKO Gmunden**

BUDGET


The current budget of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl – Salzkammergut 2024 GmbH amounts to EUR 31 million:




- EUR 26.27 million from funding providers
- EUR 1.5 million Melina Mercouri Prize from the EU
- EUR 2 million from sponsorship
- EUR 0.63 million from ticket sales
- EUR 0.6 million from other revenues (EU project funding, merchandising, etc.)

Expenditures: EUR 31 million

- EUR 15.8 million for the artistic budget
- EUR 6.9 million for personnel costs (European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 team)
- EUR 3.6 million for marketing
- EUR 4.7 million for administration







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The European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl – Salzkammergut 2024 GmbH has utilized its financial resources optimally, budgeting and spending just over half for the artistic budget to implement all cultural projects. Personnel costs are around EUR 7 million, which is modest given the implementation of 200 projects, many of them large-scale. The marketing budget is also low compared to other European Capitals of Culture, yet it successfully covered logo and CI development, image building, website, app, PR, and communication work. With EUR 4.7 million, the share of administrative costs is more than adequate. These include costs such as rent, IT, software systems, external services, office operations, etc., and also include costs from the application phase of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 amounting to EUR 325,945.

PERSONNEL

In principle, it should be noted that a highly qualified program was achieved with few personnel resources due to financial constraints. From January 1 to October 31, 2024, 39 full-time employees were employed by the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl – Salzkammergut 2024 GmbH, equivalent to 34.5 full-time units. Additionally, 41 people were employed on a project basis and 66 people on an hourly basis. Furthermore, there were four interns, two of whom were from Europe. The European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl – Salzkammergut 2024 GmbH also developed and implemented a Volunteers-EU-Program ("Volugram"). 65 volunteers supported the projects of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 from January 1 to October 31, 2024, with a total of 213 assignments.

TOURISM

European Capital of Culture Provides New Tourism Impulses

The fact that the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 motivated numerous people to travel to the cross-state mountain and lake region is shown by the tourism statistics: Around 1.56 million overnight guest arrivals were recorded in the entire Salzkammergut (Upper Austria, Salzburg, and Styria) from January to October 2024, 3.6 percent more than the previous year. The number of overnight stays increased by 2.2 percent to around 5 million.

"Culture is a strong travel motive for Upper Austria. The guest survey Tourismus Monitor Austria 2024 shows that for 21 percent of holiday guests, sights and cultural offerings are important for their holiday decision. Upper Austria is not only significantly above the Austrian average of 11 percent but has also increased by 4 percent in the last five years since 2019. The European Capital of Culture 2024 was the perfect stage for guests to discover the Salzkammergut from new and different perspectives. We are already noticing the international interest and increased international demand. The Capital of Culture is helping to further internationalize our guest base, ensuring long-term benefits." In the flagship city of Bad Ischl, around 101,000 arrivals of overnight guests were recorded in this period, an increase of 15.2 percent, and around 363,000 overnight stays, an increase of 9.6 percent compared to the previous year. Frequency measurements from anonymized mobile data show that around 5.16 million day guests stayed in Bad Ischl from January 18 to the end of October (compared to 4.6 million visitors in the same period in 2023).

"The European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 has given our region a stage for a year to showcase its cultural wealth. Numerous events and highlights have shaped the year and brought us not only national but also international attention. This stage offers an excellent opportunity to continue presenting the Salzkammergut as a top-class tourism destination in the coming years and to carry on the enthusiasm and culture of diversity." The radiance of the Capital of Culture is also evident beyond the tourism statistics: In Bad Ischl, the number of group tours in the city has more than doubled compared to 2023. 190 group tours by the end of October 2024, compared to 80 for the entire year of 2023. With their new city tours aligned with the 2024 cultural program, the Austria Guides made a valuable contribution to linking culture and tourism.

"The joint media work, coordinated between culture and tourism, has turned the enormous interest in the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 into a strong presence in national and international cultural and travel reporting," reports Winkelhofer. Around 400 media representatives from more than 21 nations traveled to the Salzkammergut and were personally looked after by Upper Austria Tourism, Salzkammergut Tourism Marketing GmbH, and Austrian National Tourist Office. The excellent cooperation with the Austrian National Tourist Office has opened up access to new international cultural markets with creative press and PR campaigns. From international press trips with almost worldwide participation to tram advertising in Barcelona to the "Plättentaxi" operating on the Grand Canal in Venice for the Biennale di Venezia.

Culture it's all of us (ALLE, ALLE! KULTUR)

The exceptional cultural year 2024, with the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut and the 200th birthday of Anton Bruckner, was the catalyst for a unique cultural-tourism initiative that had already begun to form in advance. "More than 45 cooperation partners, cultural institutions and creators, tourism associations, Austrian National Tourist Office, the Culture Department of Upper Austria, and Upper Austria Tourism have

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forged an alliance of unprecedented scope. Together, we took on the goal of strengthening Upper Austria's image as a destination for cultural travel and addressing new international visitor segments," explains Winkelhofer. The joint cultural campaign "ALLE, ALLE! KULTUR." was particularly impressive due to its integrative approach, which showcases the enormous diversity of cultural offerings in Upper Austria. The heart of the campaign is the two-and-a-half-minute video clip in which 22 ambassadors from various cultural fields – cultural creators, musicians, artists, and associations – convey the campaign message concisely.

The innovative communication approach impressed the juries of numerous national and international creative awards and film festivals. The "Golden Star" at the international tourism film festival "Golden City Gate" in Berlin in March marked the beginning of a veritable award rain. The campaign and video clip won more than 20 national and international awards, including the "Golden Dolphin" for best tourism film at the "Cannes Corporate Media & TV Awards", the special jury prize in gold at the "CAESAR Advertising Award 2024", and the Special Award "Venus for Change" at the "CCA Awards" – Austria's most important advertising award.

Boost for Tourism Innovation

The super cultural year was the trigger for the development of new offers and digital services that will improve the travel experience of guests even beyond 2024. In autumn 2023, the digital cultural experience planner "myKulTour" was introduced. With the help of artificial intelligence, "myKulTour" automatically creates customized cultural holiday and excursion plans according to the individual preferences and needs of its users and offers direct booking options for accommodations and tickets. More than 21,000 personalized experience plans have already been generated by day and holiday guests using the web-based tool for their stay in Upper Austria

The Salzkammergut took on a pioneering role in Austria with the first joint ticketing system for an entire tourism region. Since its launch on December 1, 2023, around 35,000 tickets with total sales of around 1.45 million euros have been sold through the system, in which all regions of the Salzkammergut, crossing state borders, participate.

Into the Cultural-Touristic Future

In close cooperation with the tourism associations in the Salzkammergut and Salzkammergut Tourism Marketing GmbH, with the Austrian National Tourist Office and the regional tourism organizations of Upper Austria, Styria, and Salzburg, international cultural travelers are to be inspired by the Salzkammergut beyond the year 2024. "Art & Culture" are one of the three thematic pillars on which the cross-state campaign "Salzkammergut connects" is built.

Projects such as the Upside-Down House by the lake, installations in the Dachstein Giant Ice Cave, the Attwenger concert on Dachstein, various exhibitions, and more were very well received by both locals and visitors. The region's and Obertraun's visibility increased, leading to growth in visitor and overnight stay numbers. However, the balance between locals and tourists must be carefully evaluated. Networking among participating communities and local artists and cultural initiatives was a positive aspect. The vigorous and controversial discussions about several projects and installations were, in my opinion, crucial for the region's understanding of art and culture. One criticism is the sometimes cumbersome and opaque bureaucratic processes surrounding the European Capital of Culture initiative. The European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 was a significant driver and initiator in the implementation of artistic projects in the Salzkammergut region. As a result, vacant buildings and museums were comprehensively renovated, revitalized, or conceptually redesigned. In short, the groundwork for a successful "Awakening" was laid.

Opening in January 2024 I Old Sudhaus with the central art exhibition SUDHAUS – ART WITH SALT & WATER, a welcome space about salt, water, and forest in artistic and digital form in planning Visitors 2024 (21/01/2024–31/10/2024): 24,762

The central art exhibition of the Capital of Culture sudhaus – art with salt & water took place in the Old Sudhaus in Bad Ischl, provided by Salinen Austria AG. Various approaches presented the themes of salt and water through objects, sculptures, installations, films, photographs, and sound works by renowned artists from around the world. Salinen Austria AG now aims to further use the Old Sudhaus for cultural activities. Opening in July 2024 HOTEL AUSTRIA – Museum of the City of Bad Ischl comprehensively renovated and newly set up

Start of the comprehensive renovation of the Lehár Theater Bad Ischl in December 2024. Planned completion for the 100th anniversary in 2027

The theater, named after the famous operetta composer Franz Lehár, is to be reopened in the anniversary year 2027. As part of the renovation, the theater will be restored to its architectural origin and equipped with state-of-the-art technology to enable a variety of cultural events." Gmunden: Transformation of the former city garden area into an art quarter; Opening of the monastery garden; Private infrastructure initiatives with cultural relevance – House of Ceramics, Kunsthaus 'Blaue Butter,' frames, and 'Remise 1894' – inspired; White Noise as a loan from the state of Salzburg

"I see Gmunden's participation in the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 as an opportunity to open spaces – both intellectual and visionary as well as real spaces here in our city. For example, the transformation of the former city garden area into an art quarter or the opening of the monastery garden to the public could be initiated. In the art quarter, the cultural pavilion 'White Noise' – a loan from the state of Salzburg – found its home as a visual landmark. The Capital of Culture has also proven to be a real booster for art in public spaces and initiated discourses on socially and politically relevant topics among the population. The Capital of Culture year certainly also contributed to tackling the urgently needed renovation of our city theater and securing the necessary funding. Private infrastructure initiatives with cultural relevance, such as the 'House of Ceramics,' Kunsthaus 'Blaue Butter,' the temporary art space 'frames,' or 'Remise 1894,' were also inspired by this. Interim use of ÖBB vacant buildings in Ebensee Landungsplatz, Hallstatt, Bad Aussee, and Kainisch with temporary art projects

Salt Lake Cities – STOPs and STATIONs, an artist-in-residence programme in rural areas over transport routes to vacant train stations, took place on the initiative of the Capital of Culture from April to October 2024. Artists used these as studios. Publicly accessible, they became meeting points and exhibition spaces. The inn lab also found its home there. From Pettenbach over Steinbachbrücke to Scharnstein and from Traunkirchen over Ebensee, Tauplitz, Bad Aussee, and Hallstatt, as part of "Sharing Salzkammergut – The Art of Travel", regional vacant buildings were turned into experiential places for contemporary art. The Brewery Schloss Eggenberg provided living and studio space on the premises for the artist-in-residence programme, and the residencies repeatedly cooperated with other projects of the European Capital of Culture, such as Art Your Village or the monastery garden of the former Carmelite nuns in Gmunden. ÖBB plans to revitalize some of the vacant buildings and offer, among other things, working stations for train travelers or inn labs.

First-time use of the Steinbach Hall at Attersee for a cultural event GUSTAV MAHLER Symphony No. 2 and GULDA Cello Concerto – Salzburg Philharmonic

The community of Steinbach am Attersee and the Gustav Mahler Festival 2024, in cooperation with the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024, brought Gustav Mahler's unique work back to the place of its creation. For this purpose, the Steinbach Hall, previously used exclusively for leisure and sports

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activities, was used for a cultural event for the first time. In the course of the use, a comprehensive renovation took place. The roof was renewed, a PV system and a power storage unit were installed, and the side walls and acoustics were significantly improved. The renovated Steinbach Hall will also be used for cultural events in the future.

BRUCKNER'S SALT I First Concert at the Ebensee Saline with Continuation in 2025

Around 2,000 music enthusiasts were captivated in the most spectacular acoustic space of the Salzkammergut, the Saline in Ebensee am Traunsee, with motets, symphonic excerpts, improvisations, and the unexpected. The ambitious project of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024, in cooperation with the OÖ KultureXPO Anton Bruckner 2024, the Bruckner Orchestra Linz, and the Choir Association Upper Austria, made possible by Salinen Austria AG and OÖ Theater und Orchester GmbH, is planned to continue in 2025.

SALZKAMMERQUEER

Salzkammerqueer is a community-building project that networks and makes queer people visible in the Salzkammergut. Over the past few years, a sustainable civil society group has been established. In an October retreat, a core group of about 10 people, including "Allies" (supporters of the LGBTIQ* movement), decided to continue on this path together and carry on with the project. The visions are there, and currently, the focus is on refining the financing. Additionally, a non-profit initiative has developed, responsible for organizing the first Pride Parade in the Salzkammergut (SalzkammerPride) in Bad Ischl. This symbol of diversity and tolerance will also enrich the region with its vibrancy in 2025.

INCREASE IN VISITORS TO THE ART INSTITUTIONS OF THE SALZKAMMERGUT REGION, AMONG OTHERS

One of the intentions of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 was to bring art institutions in the Salzkammergut region more into the public spotlight with special exhibitions. Due to the increased attention, many art institutions were able to record an increase in visitors in 2024 compared to previous years.

Kammerhofmuseum Bad Aussee WOLFGANG GURLITT. ART DEALER AND PROFITEER IN BAD AUSSEE (28/03/2024–03/11/2024)

Visitors in 2024: approx. 7457 (adults, students, excluding children, open for 32 weeks) **Visitors in 2023: approx. 2370** (adults, students, excluding children, open for 28 weeks)

Under the project title "The Journey of Images," the Lentos Kunstmuseum Linz and the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 presented three exhibitions as part of the program line "Power and Tradition": "The Journey of Images. Hitler's Cultural Policy, Art Trade, and Storage in the Nazi Era in the Salzkammergut" (20/03/2024–08/09/2024) at the Lentos Kunstmuseum Linz, in cooperation with the Kammerhofmuseum in Bad Aussee the exhibition "Wolfgang Gurlitt. Art Dealer and Profiteer in Bad Aussee" (28/03/2024–03/11/2024) and in the revitalized Old Marktrichterhaus in Lauffen near Bad Ischl the exhibition "The Life of Things. Stolen – Displaced – Rescued" (27/04/2024–01/09/2024). "An estimated 60% of the visitors in 2024 came to see the exhibition 'Wolfgang Gurlitt. Art Dealer and Profiteer in Bad Aussee.' The high number of well-attended tours also reflects the great interest in the exhibition. Many visitors also took the time to view our large permanent exhibition. Therefore, the exhibition cooperation with the Lentos Kunstmuseum Linz and the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 was also sustainable for the museum. With the special exhibition planned for 2025 'End of the War – The Final Phase of the Third Reich in the Ausseerland,' the Kammerhofmuseum Bad Aussee aims to utilize the obvious great interest in exhibitions with regional historical content to sustainably strengthen the museum's position as a place for dealing with regional history." Al WEIWEI. TRANSCENDING BORDERS. A project of the OÖ Landes-Kultur GmbH I Associated project of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 (13/06/2024–27/10/2024)

The Kaiserpark with the Marble Palace and the Imperial Stables is one of the tourist highlights of Bad Ischl. In the Imperial Stables, a triptych consisting of a video performance, an installation, and a film titled 'Crossing The Blue Bridge' by the Romani artist and activist **Selma Selman** from Bosnia and Herzegovina was on display. The visitor response was extraordinarily positive. From June 13 to October 27, 2024, works by the renowned Chinese artist **Ai Weiwei** were presented in the Marble Palace and Kaiserpark, in which he sometimes refers to the earliest Chinese dynasties. Together with significant archaeological finds from the Hallstatt period (800–450 BC), they created a unique space for the dialogue between art and history. For 2025, another use of the area with works by the internationally renowned artist Erwin Wurm is firmly planned.

THEATER AND LITERATURE

THE LITTLE PRINCE - RELOADED I Pilot project and world premiere in Bad Ischl wants to continue

"More than a hundred students could breathe life into the Little Prince again from 2025. 'The Little Prince – Reloaded' is based on a unique partnership between primary schools, state music schools, higher vocational schools, regional businesses, tourism, and public authorities for at least one school year. The European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 financed the cultural mediation project for children and families, aiming to promote the talents and potentials of the participating children and young people. 'The Little Prince – Reloaded' is a valuable extension of the regular curriculum and teaching offerings in schools, keeping up with the times! SALTICE I Laakirchen I World premiere in Laakirchen

The fairy tale of salt and ice. A children's opera told with paper, origami art, dance, and music, depicting legends and folklore around the salt mountain. Children and young people created a play on-site with artists from Malta, Germany, Austria, and Japan. The continuation of the project is planned.

C'est BEAU! - It's Beautiful! I World premiere in Bad Aussee and at the Brotfabrik in Vienna

The inclusive dance performance with international dancers with and without disabilities, a production of DK-BEL and 6e Sens (France), was a particularly touching experience. On November 17, 2024, they also performed at the Brotfabrik Vienna and played several times in Paris and throughout France during the 2024 Olympic Games.

HAMMER! I World premiere in Scharnstein

"A Capital of Culture is not a vacation, but a journey, and those who travel can tell stories. A journey means daring to venture into the uncharted land of Terra Incognita. In an artistic sense, this can be virtually anything. In our case, it was an old, historic factory hall in Scharnstein. With the music theater piece 'HAMMER!,' which premiered in April 2024 in Scharnstein, the RAT Big Band brought Scharnstein's industrial history back into the collective consciousness. REMOTE BAD ISCHL I World premiere in Bad Ischl continues

The alternative city tour by the theater label Rimini Protokoll was received with great interest and was very well received. The city of Bad Ischl and the Bad Ischl Tourism Association will offer the extraordinary city tour to interested visitors and guests in the future.

THE WHITE HORSE INN OF LAUFFEN I World premiere in Bad Ischl/Lauffen continues 2025

The White Horse, a play about the hidden stories of the oldest market in the Salzkammergut, will continue. "In realizing our play 'The White Horse Inn of Lauffen,' over eighty people from Lauffen and the Salzkammergut region helped and worked together. I would like to thank everyone involved. It expanded the Ausseer Baroque Days 2024 in an unusual way. The European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 supported the financing of the composition and libretto commissioned by Verena Frey. A revival is being worked on.

THE UNHEARD THINGS I World premiere in Bad Aussee and Altaussee

Theater performance by Theater am Bahnhof, shown on the markets in Bad Aussee and Altaussee with a fictional radio show on provenance research and restitution of looted Jewish property, is planning performances in Vienna.

SALT IN THE SALT OFFICE I Prelude in Hallstatt I World premiere 2025/2026 at the Musiktheater Linz

The prelude to the mobile chamber opera freely based on Peter Handke's "Kali – An Early Winter Story" – composed by Gerhard Stäbler and Kunsu Shim, libretto by Hermann Schneider – took place on September 7 and 8, 2024, in the Old Salt Office in Hallstatt. The intimate setting in the Salt Office will come to full fruition in the 2025/2026 season at the Musiktheater Linz.

HOMELAND-WORLD. In Search of Lost Times and Hopes I Six scenic world premieres in Bad Ischl

Six texts, developed as part of an artist-in-residence program by Ada Diagne (Vienna), Guido Wertheimer (Buenos Aires and Berlin), Thomas Perle (Romania and Vienna), Natalka Vorozhbyt (Kyiv, Ukraine), Lisa Wentz (Tyrol), and Thomas Köck (Berlin and Vienna), were staged at the Lehár Theater and will be further developed into complete plays. Discussions with theaters in Europe regarding further world premieres are currently underway. Thomas Perle's "Danube Waves", which was seen in Bad Ischl, premiered on November 22, 2024, at the German State Theater in Timişoara.

EVERYTHING THAT HAPPENED AND WOULD HAPPEN I Austrian premiere in Hallein

The multidimensional installation by Heiner Goebbels – a commission by 14–18 NOW, WW1 Centenary Art Commissions, Artangel, Park Avenue Armory, and Ruhrtriennale – with music, light, performance, speech, objects, and films was brought to the Austrian stage by the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 in cooperation with the Salzburg Festival on the Perner Island in Hallein. After two sold-out performances, the production will be seen in Paris, London, and Taipei.

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G/R/E/T/E, the sky falls I World premiere in Gmunden

"Dance pioneer Grete Wiesenthal was the starting point of research initiated by Wanda Golonka, director of the MA choreography program at HZT Berlin, with her students in Gmunden as part of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024. Throughout her life, Grete Wiesenthal was a defining figure in expressive dance in Austria, a dance that left behind the guided lines of classical ballet to make movement freer and more playful. In this sense, the young choreographers opened a space for explorations with passers-by and the architecture of the square on the market square in Gmunden. The mountain, the lake, the bells: they provided a framework for the piece. It will have a lasting impact on us and show new ways of working. With Bene Greiner, Justin Ouidiga, Nabalüm, deeLinde. A co-production with Christoph Schlingensief's Operndorf Afrika in Ziniaré, Burkina Faso.

EUROPE SPEECH BY STEFAN ZWEIG I Six World Premieres by six theaters in Europe in Bad Ischl (Cooperation with Mitos21 – European Theatre Network)

Tjana Thiessenhusen (Berliner Ensemble), Alexander Klessinger (Thalia Theater Hamburg), Micol Jalla & Diego Pleuteri (Teatro Stabile Torino), Balàsz Dohy (Katona József Színház Budapest), Lisaboa Houbrechts & Gorges Ocloo (Toneelhuis Antwerpen), Bernhard Øye, and Maria Bergström (Dramaten Stockholm) created six twenty-minute micro-dramas based on Stefan Zweig's speech on European unification. The conditions were the same for everyone: one text as a common basis, a maximum of two performers, minimal technical effort. Six theatrical comments from different perspectives on the still fragile state of Europe. What does Stefan Zweig's dream of European unification as the only protection against war and nationalism still mean to us today? A visit to Europe while it still stands!

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MUSIC

SALZKAMMER(SC)HALL 1 + 2 + 3 + 4 I Four World Premieres on the railway line from Attnang-Puchheim to Stainach-Irdning, from Donnerkogel to Unterhörbach, and from Hollerberg to Hochknall throughout the Salzkammergut, at Offensee, and in the Asamer gravel and concrete works

MRS. THOMAS AND MR. MARTIN I First Performances in the Salzkammergut in Bad Mitterndorf and Steinbach am Attersee

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club music. The focus was on cross-genre and multimedia projects, which were enthusiastically received in the Salzkammergut region.

HYMN TO THE SALZKAMMERGUT I World Premiere in Altaussee

Bernadette La Hengst, together with choirs from the region, created a hymn for the Salzkammergut, which was heard for the first time in Kurpark Altaussee on October 26, 2024. "How do we want to live in the future? Where do we want to work? Whom do we want to love? How do we want to live? SILENT ECHOES: DACHSTEIN I World Premiere in the Parsifal Dome in the Dachstein Giant Ice Cave

Commissioned by the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024, American sound artist Bill Fontana created Silent Echoes: Dachstein in the Parsifal Dome of the Giant Ice Cave – an incredible duet: the melting of the glacier and the bells of Notre-Dame. Bill Fontana's site-specific duet formed the basis for a "sound bridge," a statement on the fragility of art and nature. It was transmitted to various locations: to the New Cathedral – Mariendom in Linz during the kickoff for the 24-hour birthday celebration for Anton Bruckner, to the Kunsthaus Graz, to the MuseumsQuartier in Vienna, and through the Ö1 website. "I was particularly interested in the bell Emmanuel, whose resonances sound in a clear F-sharp major chord. It is also the only bell of Notre-Dame that survived the French Revolution." SONG SONG I World Premieres in Vorchdorf and Bad Aussee

Two unique evenings featuring, among others, Ars Antiqua Austria, Die Goas, Duo Marie Theres Stickler-Peter Havlicek, Karoliina Kantelinen, Michael Köhlmeier, Gunar Letzbor, Alois Mühlbacher, Mamadou Diabate. Gstanzln twisted to the point of incomprehensibility; songs with long stories, rambling on and pointing to connections with the Griots, the troubadours of West Africa, the secret messages of the Joik among the Finnish Sami, whose language was long forbidden, the lush songs in Baroque music, and the secret O-speech in Wienerlied. The networks and threads of the two evenings were woven by one who has stories to tell – Michael Köhlmeier. BUILDING CULTURE AND CRAFTSMANSHIP

How will we build in the future? How do we build our future? Especially against the backdrop of the escalating climate crisis, the program of the European Capital of Culture Bad Ischl Salzkammergut 2024 focused on different facets of building culture as part of the programme line "Globalokal – Building The New". In the craft projects, a bridge was built between the carefully maintained traditions of the region and contemporary approaches. The initiated projects received great attention and ranged from participatory knowledge transfer to international symposia. Some projects are to be continued beyond the Capital of Culture year.

Start in January 2024 and continuation of ROOMS WITH A VIEW – Regional Boutique Room Network in the Salzkammergut

As part of "Sharing Salzkammergut – The Art of Travel", Studio Lucy D. (Barbara Ambrosz and Karin Santorso) together with Kim + Heep (Vienna, Korea), InFABric architects (Paris), and mischer'traxler studio (Vienna) designed a furniture and object collection based on typical themes that characterize the Salzkammergut: wood/plank cut, textile/traditional costume, plants/grass, animals/hunting, minerals/salt. The design concepts were implemented by regionally typical craft businesses. A successful project that will be continued. "The implementation of Rooms with a View was a great challenge for us. The participating hoteliers from the Almtal to Bad Mitterndorf, international designers, and regional craftsmen had different needs and expectations, and bringing all of this together required a lot of commitment and flexibility. Over time, everyone became enthusiastic and really put in the effort to support us in the best possible way. Guests appreciate the modern interpretation of the Salzkammergut that we created with our design objects. The feedback is good, and now we are planning an artistic continuation and many more Rooms with a View throughout Upper Austria." Barbara Ambrosz and Karin Santorso, Studio Lucy D.

SCALA Salzkammergut Craft Art Lab

The new paths between craft and art will continue to be explored and the regional and international network will be further maintained. For this purpose, a cooperative organizational model will be established in the next step to implement future projects.

"It is in the nature of art to address burning questions of the present. It is in the nature of craftsmanship to act sustainably and solution-oriented. Craftsmanship in construction and living has always implied careful handling of available natural resources, modularity, durability, repairability, and recyclability. Through valuable experiential knowledge and skills built over generations in dealing with materials and techniques in a regional context, craftsmanship guarantees a future for both the preservation of historical building substance and culture and sustainable, intergenerationally usable, and circular-friendly construction and living. Only a funded yet non-profit-oriented approach to raising awareness and providing education (lectures, workshops, events, etc.) across all segments of the population can break through the commercially driven, constant manipulation that opposes a sustainable future. Interregional, national, and interdisciplinary networking (e.g., with art), cooperation, exchange, and experiential knowledge between craft and art are an important and public-friendly foundation for this. The common ground on new paths between craft and art is manual skills, used materials, and a culture of encounter that is open to exchange and mediation." Barbara Kern, SCALA team

SIMPLE SMART BUILDINGS: simple but time-tested materials and craftsmanship knowledge in building culture

Simple Smart Buildings exists beyond the Capital of Culture year. The responsible parties Friedrich Idam, Günther Kain, and Andreas Zohner will continue to conduct research and educational activities in the field of regional – simple, but time-tested – materials and craftsmanship knowledge in building culture.

GOMDE: PLACES OF CHANGE: the meditative oases in the Buddhist Center Gomde in Scharnstein remain until nature reclaims them

Students from Austria, Germany, and the United Kingdom designed meditative oases for the Buddhist Center Gomde in Scharnstein. The installations, made from natural materials (primarily clay and wood), remain publicly accessible in the area of the Buddhist Center Gomde on the Bäckerberg in Scharnstein until they are gradually reclaimed by nature.

"The project 'Gomde: Places of Change' shows that experimenting 1:1 is possible when all participants engage without prejudice. The team from Gomde and local experts walked this path with us. The collaboration was intensive, a challenge in which not only experimental installations that give tangible shape to the intangible were created, but also an incredible wealth of experience in communal action. INTERVENTA HALLSTATT 2024: The building culture of tomorrow is a culture of awareness

"With the interventa Hallstatt 2024, we were able to introduce a convincing format for building culture that represents the regional space as an exemplar for the global rural area. Exemplary projects showed solutions for building cultural challenges that apply to many regions of the world. Analogies, as well as differences, provided mutual insights also in relation to the challenges in the Salzkammergut. The response to the interdisciplinary concept and the performative and participatory opportunities for exchange between participants and visitors was extremely positive. Such a symposium is an ideal instrument to generate relevant knowledge. We find a continuation essential for a future-oriented building culture and would be very pleased if it could be continued. More than 1,500 visitors came into contact with the interventa, whether at the performances in January 2024, at the symposium in September at the HTBLA Hallstatt, or as visitors to the interventa website, where all lectures and discussions can be listened to. Projects from the thematic lines "Power and Tradition" and "Sharing Salzkammergut – The Art of Travel", such as *Paths of Resistance* and *Willy-Fred Tours*, which explore the history of National Socialism, resistance fighters, and deserters through walking and cycling tours, will continue to feature in the Upper Austria Tourism programme beyond 2024. *The Great Space Walk* will remain accessible until 2035, and the *Regional Express – A Time Travel Between Gmunden and Bad Aussee*, a project by Petra Ardai, Ella Raidel, and Marlene Rutzendorfer, will stay available to train travelers.

XENIA HAUSNER: ATEMLUFT in Bad Ischl (until Spring 2025)

Renowned artist Xenia Hausner, closely connected to the Salzkammergut, presented her first public sculpture, *Atemluft* (Breath of Air), as part of the European Capital of Culture 2024. This 3-meter-tall aluminum and bronze sculpture addresses societal and existential challenges of our time. Displayed at Bad Ischl's train station forecourt, it will remain until spring 2025, with discussions underway regarding its long-term placement.

CRITICAL AND CONTROVERSIAL: Exhibition in Bad Ischl's Kurpark Continues

Bad Ischl's imperial heritage often overshadows alternative perspectives, perpetuating kitsch and historical distortions under the Habsburg myth. As part of the cultural year, Hannes Leidinger, Nadia Rapp-Wimberger, Verena Moritz, and Lenz Mosbacher created an accessible exhibition in the Kurpark. This exhibition examines complex historical events before and after 1918 and remains accessible to the public free of charge.

ÅHNLROAS – ALT:NEU:MODISCH: A Salzkammergut Portrait Series. Best of Salzkammergut in the Sissi Park in Bad Ischl and Laakirchen

Portraits of "mature supermodels" showcasing styles from quirky and modern to traditional and classic were exhibited in senior homes throughout the region, turning these spaces into venues of art and community. Select portraits under the title *Åhnlroas – Alt:Neu:Modisch* are displayed in Sissi Park (Bad Ischl) and Laakirchen along the "Generationenweg" and will remain publicly accessible.

Swing Theory of Hegel: Sculpture in Traunkirchen (Until 2025)

Fernando Sánchez Castillo's bronze swing sculpture, *Swing Theory of Hegel*, depicting a figure precariously balanced against gravity, will stay in Traunkirchen's town square by the lake until 2025. This piece, part of the *Villa Karbach* exhibition curated by Paolo Bianchi and Martin Sturm, remains a striking and dynamic landmark.

INTO THE DEEP | MEMORIES FROM THE FUTURE: Ebensee Installation (Until 2027)

Eva Schlegel and 2MVD's augmented reality sculptures combine sky and water at Ebensee's Sky Waterwalk. *Into the Deep*, the final piece in their *Memories From the Future* series, will be accessible via QR codes until 2027. **Eva Schlegel** remarked, "The European Capital of Culture gathered numerous exciting interventions and exhibitions. It will be missed!"

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FUTURE IS NOW! Graffiti and Street Art in Ebensee

Future is Now! was a participatory art project that aimed to visualise young people's visions of the future in public spaces with the help of graffiti and street art. Under the professional guidance of Michael Url from Mural Harbor GmbH, the pupils were given a practical introduction to different techniques and varieties of this urban art form. The visible results of this workshop process were passed on to 'Nychos' and 'Yubia', two internationally renowned and respected street artists, who integrated the content and subjects of the young people into two large murals at the Weberei and at the former girls' primary school as part of their work stays in Ebensee. Both works are now part of the Ebensee townscape.

PLATEAU BLO: Permanent Installation Starting April 2025

After a year as a floating platform hosting exhibitions, performances, and events on Lake Traun, *PLATEAU BLO* will find a permanent home in the flora pondtemporary sculpture park at Stiftsteich in St. Florian, linking the 2024 cultural programme with the Bruckner Year 2024.

A Gift for Bad Ischl: Hamish Fulton's Walking Art FROM THE GREEN SOLEWEG UP TO THE HALLSTÄTTER GLACIER AND BACK DOWN TO THE SUMMER SOLSTICE AUSTRIA 2024

Hamish Fulton's two-week journey along the historic Salt Path and Hallstätter Glacier inspired a large enamel artwork gifted to the town of Bad Ischl.

ART YOUR VILLAGE | Simon Starling's Hallstätter See Pavilion (inverted): discussions underway

The Hallstätter See Pavilion (Inverted) by British artist Simon Starling began with the discovery of a modestly furnished wooden shed in the centre of Hallstatt. This structure, which has a natural knothole in its front façade, was the catalyst for the idea of turning a replica of this building into a camera obscura with the knothole as an opening. A camera obscura is a simple pinhole camera that creates an inverted image of the outside world through the incidence of light through a small opening.

To ensure that the image shown is not upside down, the replica shed was also turned upside down and now stands on its roof ridge. The projected image created on a screen inside - the lake and the salt mountain outside - is correctly orientated in relation to the inverted house. Starling's work, which enjoys great popularity and is one of the most impressive landmarks, is now to remain at its location in Obertraun.

ART YOUR VILLAGE | Dirk Schlichting's Salzmadonna in Roitham am Traunfall

Dirk Schlichting has found a marvellous piece of salt stone in the salt mine in Altaussee. Beginning with the extraction of the salt stone in the Altaussee mine, Schlichting traces the route of the salt transport to Roitham am Traunfall. After a ceremony at which the salt stone was set up on Raiffeisenplatz, the artist began to publicly carve The Salt Madonna from the sandstone. It stands as a reminder of the 600 years of salt shipping on the Traun and the former economic importance of Roitham, until it was made to disappear by the rain.

ART YOUR VILLAGE I The exhibition *Eyes as Big as Plates* by Karoline Hjorth & Riitta Ikonen along the 7-Brücken-Weg between the swimming lake and Gasthof Silbermair in Almtal, St. Konrad remains

The exhibition is the photographic conclusion of encounters with people from St. Konrad. The Eyes as Big as Plates project maps the relationship of modern man to nature and has actively involved the participants in the creation of the photographic portrait. The Norwegian-Finnish artist duo Karoline Hjorth and Riitta Ikonen bring a folklore-inspired view of the relationship between man and nature. Each photograph shows a solitary figure in a landscape, a sculpture made from natural elements of their choice. Interested visitors can continue to trace the artist duo's intentions along the 7-Brücken-Weg between the swimming lake and Gasthof Silbermair.

ANALOG! Olaf Holzapfel's Public Stage in Bad Goisern

Olaf Holzapfel has erected a usable sculpture on the banks of the River Traun in Bad Goisern. The public stage

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made of landscape materials, straw and wood will remain as a stage for spontaneous events and public performances after 2024. The size of the Stage for Land and People is suitable for individual speakers, DJs, bathers and various clubs in Bad Goisern.


